RHYMING IDEAS

SEE OVER for a schemata of St John's Gospel from Father John Gerhard S.J. Scholar Peter Ellis based a commentary on Gerhard in his *The Genius of John*.

Father Gerhard (with whom I have corresponded) had a computer programme analyse the words and ideas in the Joannine text. Thus he discovered that it was written with **rhyming ideas**, using a rhyme pattern a-b-c-b-a.


This cross-over parallelism is called **chiastic:** the last idea rhymes with the first, and the second idea rhymes with the second last. Within each of these divisions there are subdivisions of the same pattern, and so on within them. Like our **sound-rhymes** and rhythm poetry: such schemes help memorization. The Psalms have an even **simpler parallelism** of rhyming ideas: a-a; b-b, verse by verse, or alphabetical first letters.

Mr Bernard Sadler of Sydney has discovered something similar in his According to Matthew (2nd Edition), available from him, 02 9453 0123, <u>bsadler@iinet.net.au</u>. He shows how St Matthew repeats words, phrases, or whole sentences in a variety of parallelisms (some chiastic) to divide or unite the separate items. He makes it seven big chapters in all, each divided into five parts. He uses the literal translation of the Douai Bible to make the parallelisms more obvious.

Our chapter-&-verse divisions in the 46 Old and 27 New Testament books of a Bible were unknown until Archbishop Stephen Langton of Canterbury published the present chapter breaks in 1228. Subdisivions of chapters into verses came later when Santes Pagnini O.P. added verse numbers in his new-Latin Old Testament in 1528, and his Paris publisher Robert Etienne divided the New Testament into verses, in 1555.

IMAGINE the piety of the early Church Fathers finding Bible texts without chapters or verses! They must have known most of the Bible by heart — like our Lord finding a place he wanted to read from in the scroll of Isaiah; (Luke 4:17).
